Evans was able to do just that – diving from a 35' research vessel to explore the Pacific offshore oil platforms. A unique vertical habitat, the

Pacific offshore platforms offer marine life shadows and shelter. Open ocean water flows through. Food is abundant. Life aggregates and propagates to create a Marine Megatropolis.








be the first alternative uses for




offshore oil platforms. Artifacts from these expeditions include self-designed camera housings and log books identifying relevant survey data from more than 850 dives.









Awarded more than 30 patents, Evans' Tan Delta Force Fin is part of the permanent collections of the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Twenty-two

of his products were displayed at the Architecture and Design Museum of the County of Los Angeles. His OPS Force Fin, made for Jean Michel Cousteau's Oceans Future Society, was honored as a

Time Magazine "Innovation of the Year."

Photographer Selections from Evans' Channel Islands Collection, "Baby Elephant Seals" and "Birds on a Rock," are hallmarks of the Channel Islands National Park. The Sea Center of the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History opened with 47 of his photographs. He has

produced two multimedia presentations for the Los Angeles County Cabrillo Marine Museum - "Man Made Oases" and "The California Channel Islands." **Entrepreneur** An accomplished SCUBA diver, Evans has made more than 5,000 dives, 850 dives photo-documenting life below offshore oil platforms in the Santa Barbara Channel. For these projects, he

designed underwater camera housings for time-lapse systems, camera towing systems, and a buoy system to carry cameras to preset depths. Marine Megatropolis honors those adventures. Bob Evans has served as Executive Director, President, and Director of the Academy of Underwater Arts and Sciences, which awarded him a NOGI. He is a member of the Ocean Artists Society. In 1996, he was granted an honorary Master of Science degree by

the Trustees of Brooks Institute of Photography for extraordinary

contributions to photography, art, and science.
