The Lure of Lighthouses & Dancing Waves is now

dramatic photographs are printed on aluminum to enhance the color and light of lighthouses near and far—from Cape Hatteras on the East Coast and Point Loma on the West, to Portugal and Australia. The images are coupled with breath-taking photos of waves throughout the world. Twenty-five panoramic photographs capture mesmerizing lighthouse landscapes, evoking a strong emotion of place in the maritime world. For thousands of years, lighthouse towers and their beacons have made

maritime exploration, trade, and travel possible. Symbols of resilience and safety, their lights tirelessly project out to sea, warning mariners of

approaching coasts, shallow water, and rocky terrain.

Lighthouses illuminate a sea that is never still. Whether looking at the ocean from the shore or a boat, we expect to see waves. A transmission of wind energy across the ocean, a wave travels endlessly until it breaks onshore. How it breaks depends on how it meets the shore, and whether the profile of the shoreline is shallow or steep. The exhibition includes nine photographs of waves from around the world, which can accompany the lighthouses or can stand alone as their own show.



Dan Merkel began his career taking pictures of his friends. When he was hired to work for various surfing magazines in the early 70s, surfing was just being recognized as a sport with international competitions and professional surfers.

Being an experienced surfer himself, Merkel was able to get in the middle of the action with his cameras, which gave his

images more immediacy and energy. In order to do this, Merkel designed much of his own waterproof housing that protected his equipment and allowed him to follow focus. Beginning in the late 1970s and continuing through the 1990s, Merkel switched his focus to commercial cinematography and became an Emmywinning filmmaker working on classic surfing films including Free Ride, Big Wednesday, Endless Summer II, and many others. According to 1977 World Surfing Champion Shaun Tomson,

whose recent book The Surfer and the Sage featured Dan's images, "Dan Merkel is one of the surfing world's most acclaimed and courageous action photographers. Combining a unique eye for composition in exceptionally dangerous situations, Dan captured some of the most intense moments of his subjects' lives, artistically freezing and sharing each in the maelstrom of one-thousandth-of-a-second increments. Dan reveled in capturing beauty in the impact zone, the most violent area in the ocean. Whether he is doing still photography, music videos, commercials, or commercial films, Dan brings the same level of perfectionism and ambition that has propelled him throughout his long career."
